Student loan defaulters pay with their lives

In the latest of Ronald seven point plan for the destruction of the American education system as we now know it, the President has outlined his newest plan for solving the problem of student loan defaulters. The program, presented to the press this week, proposes a simple deal: your money or your life. 
Whatever the outcome, the message was clear: pay up.

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


Diamondmen lack talent
