Earlier this week, Rensselaer's amateur radio club, W2SZ, announced that it had done its first worthwhile act since the club's conception, the jamming of WRPI transmissions. Site 7, on the end of Cogswell. Too far away from everything. Same with Site 8, which would have the added disadvantage of being on the edge of the Slide time!






